

Objective of this Live Session

Why? Because 25% of your final exam in DP Film is based on your ability to speak about film.

Understanding how to approach the Presentation, what it looks like in written form and listening to a real-life example will ensure that you understand the expectations clearly and will be able to create that exam piece with confidence.

- A detailed critical analysis of a continuous extract from a prescribed film.
- The chosen extract from the film is no longer than 5 minutes in length.
- The recorded presentation is no longer than 10 minutes in length

You have 3 choices:

- The Night of the Hunter (1955) Charles Laughton USA, Crime, Drama, Film Noir - A religious fanatic marries a gullible widow whose young children are reluctant to tell him where their real daddy hid \$10,000 he'd stolen in a robbery. (IMDB)
- In the Mood for Love Faa yeung nin wa (2000) Wong Kar-Wei Hong Kong, Drama, Romance - Two neighbours, a woman and a man, form a strong bond after both suspect extramarital activities of their spouses. However, they agree to keep their bond platonic so as not to commit similar wrongs. (IMDB)
- A Separation Betsuri (2011) Asghar Farhadi

Iran, Drama - A married couple are faced with a difficult decision - to improve the life of their child by moving to another country or to stay in Iran and look after a deteriorating parent who has Alzheimer's disease. (IMDB)

Choose a Film:

- The best way to choose a film is watch all three options. Why? Because you just don't know, until you have watched them which one will attract your attention the most.
- Watch the films in an un-interrupted environment (no chat, no phones, no pauses). Why? Because you need to be reading the text and paying close attention to the what the narrative is showing you.
- Think about the each film and the moment that sticks with you most strongly from the story. *Why?*

Because this is probably where you will choose your sequence from. This moment is often a point in the narrative where you have a realisation about the story.

Choose a Sequence:

- Think about the film you liked the best and the moment that you remember the most. Find that moment in the film. Why? This is where you start to look for your sequence. Find the moment and watch that segment of the film.
- The sequence should not be longer than 5 minutes. Why? Because it is the IBO expectations and more than 5 minutes is a lot of text to explore. I recommend that your sequence is between 4-5 minutes, no less than 4 no more than 5.

Research

Start exploring to find about the film:

- How was the film received? (Reviews)
- What awards did the film win? (Articles)
- What was the directors intent? (Interviews).
- What genre conventions are used? (Genre Theory)
- How does this film compare to other films like it? (Film History)

Good Sources are sources that are considered as academic because the people writing them are known to be knowledgeable in their field and the writing has been checked by a review team such as a professor or an editor.

- Academic Essays
- Newspaper/Magazine Articles
- · Books
- Film Reviews
- Other Films

Weak Sources are sources that are <u>not</u> considered as 'academic' because the people writing them are <u>not</u> viewed as knowledgeable in their field and the writing has <u>not</u> been checked by a review team such as a professor or an editor.

- Personal Blogs
- Rating Sites/Fan Sites
- · Wikipedia
- YouTube Videos

The Structuring an Oral template is just a suggestion on how to lay out your presentation. It is not a formula, it is a guide. You are not expected to hit every bullet point the outline, those are there to help you think about the film language elements that you can choose to focus on.



Recording the Presentation

This must be done in the presence of your SBC at school

Tips when recording

- Give yourself at least 30 minutes for your recording. Why? Because that gives you time to set-up, relax, and feel like you are not being rushed.
- Make sure you have a quiet space to record in. Why? Noise is distracting and sounds terrible for the examiner.
- Ask your SBC to make a back-up recording. Why? Just in case your primary recoding device fails you.
- Have your notes laid out before you start. Why? This will calm you down and make you feel organised and so that you are not tempted to shuffle paper around while talking.

Tips when recording con't

- Have a timer visible so that you can keep tracking of time. Why? This helps you to pace yourself to meet the 10 minutes.
- Don't be afraid of pauses
- Try to talk at a normal pace
- Try not to fidget
- Bring a glass of water with you
- Breathe
